

PROGRAMME GUIDELINES

- Public Behaviour: Displaying affection in public is generally frowned upon.
 Maintain a respectful distance and behaviour, especially when interacting with people of the opposite gender.
- 5. **Dining Etiquette:** When dining, use your right hand for eating, as the left hand is traditionally used for personal hygiene. If you're sharing a meal with others, wait for the host to start eating before you begin.

- 6. **Giving and Receiving:** When giving or receiving items, use your right hand or both hands as a sign of respect. Use the right hand to pass objects, especially when dealing with food.
- 7. **Pointing and Gestures:** Pointing with your index finger is considered impolite. Instead, gesture with an open hand or use your thumb.
- 8. **Religious Sites:** When visiting mosques or temples, dress modestly and remove your shoes before entering. Women might be required to cover their hair with a scarf.
- Tipping: Tipping is not widely practiced in Malaysia, as a service charge is often included in bills. However, leaving a small amount of change is appreciated.
- 10. **Cultural Sensitivity:** Be aware of local customs and practices and avoid behaviour that could be considered offensive or disrespectful.
